Tamil Canadians mourn 25 years of violence

(Toronto) Throughout the month of July, the Canadian Tamil Congress (CTC) in collaboration with various community organizations will be hosting events commemorating the 25th anniversary of the arrival of Tamils in Canada as a result of the anti-Tamil violence of Black July in Sri Lanka. Between July 24 and July 29 1983, a period referred to as Black July, Tamils were systematically targeted with violence in Colombo and many other parts of Sri Lanka. In those few days, thousands lost their lives, homes and sense of security. Black July is poignant for the global Tamil diaspora and especially for Tamil Canadians for the welcome they received in Canada as they fled the violence in their homeland.

“Canada opened its arms to the Tamil refugees fleeing the anti-Tamil violence in Sri Lanka,” said David Poopalapillai, National Spokesperson for the Canadian Tamil Congress. “We would not be the 250,000 strong community that we are today, if it were not for the compassion and kindness of the Canadian people. As we thank Canadians, it is also important for us as a community to remember all those who lost their lives during Black July and the twenty-five succeeding years of armed conflict in Sri Lanka.”

The Tamil-Canadian community has come to embrace Canada as its home, however, Tamil-Canadians will always remember the tragic circumstances that led them to up-root their lives and families. CTC is showcasing their stories through several signature events that will be held across the nation including Vancouver, Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto.

Play: In association with Asylum Theatre Group "What if the Rain Fails" will chronicle the life of a Tamil refugee from Sri Lanka who escaped the anti-Tamil violence in 1983 and sought refuge in Canada. Employing testimonies, poems and multimedia, the play vividly portrays the moral and material challenges that Tamil refugees encounter in the Diaspora. ***An interesting dimension in this compelling intergenerational production, is that some of the players, including the lead, are survivors of Black July.***
